Schools can order free school meal vouchers for eligible pupils, adding to the support available for disadvantaged families.

An online service for schools, the scheme allows schools to place orders for supermarket gift cards on behalf of parents and carers whose children are eligible for free school meals.

The vouchers are worth £15 a week per child and families can receive codes by email to redeem themselves, or as a gift card provided by post, collection or delivery to families without internet access.

Remote inspections of schools and further education providers will begin from 25 January, with a particular focus on how well children and learners are being <u>educated remotely</u>. Ofsted will inspect schools rated 'inadequate' or 'requires improvement' as planned, but we will also follow up on complaints raised by parents across all grades of school in order to resolve issues. As these inspections will not involve an on-site visit, they will be unable to cover the full scope of a monitoring inspection. We will publish details of the inspection process shortly.

Ofsted will continue to undertake on-site inspections if they have immediate concerns – for example about safeguarding, the leadership of a school or a failure to provide education to children.

Updated 27 January 2021- Ofsted

Routine inspection remains suspended until later in 2021 due to the COVID-19 (coronavirus) pandemic. However, resuming some inspection activity in January 2021 – particularly for those providers most in need of support – will enable Ofsted to continue to fulfil these requirements.

- From January, Ofsted will resume monitoring inspections of schools judged inadequate at their previous inspection and some schools graded as requires improvement. These will not result in a grade.
- Emergency inspections of schools will continue as they have done throughout the pandemic, in response to any serious concerns raised with Ofsted.
- Routine inspections, which result in a school being awarded a new grade or being confirmed in its current grade, will resume in the summer term.

Ofsted are publishing this statement alongside their <u>operational notes and guidance</u> for monitoring visits in schools, colleges and other further education and skills providers and early years assurance inspections for the spring term.

So that pupils and their parents know what to expect from their school if they need to self-isolate, or where national or local restrictions require them to remain at home, we are asking schools to publish information about their remote education provision on their websites by 25 January 2021.

To support school leaders in setting out that information on their websites, the department has worked with schools to design this template. It is aligned to the <u>expectations for remote education</u>, to which schools must have regard under the <u>temporary continuity direction</u> given by the Secretary of State for Education.

The template is not mandatory, and schools should feel free to adapt it to suit their context. For example, while it has been designed to be used at the whole-school level, some schools might find it helpful to provide different information for different key stages or subjects.

The review framework is for internal school/trust use and to support detailed discussions with staff and governors in schools on appropriate next steps.

This framework aims to help MAT leaders, school leaders and governors in England to:

- identify the strengths and areas for improvement in their school or trust's remote education provision
- find resources (including training), guidance and networks to help them improve their provision
