

#### Updates from Ofsted and the DFE December 2024

Since September 2024 inspection outcomes for primary schools published in Essex have been as follows:

21 that were category 2 schools remained as category 2 schools 1 school that was a category 1 school remained as a category 1 school

3 schools that were category 3 schools are now category 2 schools 1 school that was a category 2 school is now a category 1 school

2 schools that were category 2 schools are now category 3 schools 1 school that was a category 1 school is now a category 2 school

This means that of the 29 schools identified 21 remained the same, 4 improved and 3 declined.

## Ofsted publishes inspector training materials - GOV.UK

Ofsted inspections and visits: deferring, pausing and gathering additional evidence

Updated the reasons Ofsted may defer an inspection to include where a state-funded school with a religious character has already been notified of an inspection under section 48 of the Education Act 2005 (or equivalent inspection in an academy). This is as long as there are no exceptional circumstances that would require the inspection to proceed. Please follow link for further updates.

## Sir Martyn Oliver's speech to the Confederation of

#### School ...

#### What we've changed so far

Schools will know by Monday afternoon if we're coming and that your routine inspection will start on the Tuesday.

We've put new policies and training in place to make sure inspectors deal sensitively and consistently with well-being concerns.

We've made our handbooks clearer, so you know exactly what we're looking for when we review your school's single central record.

We've also provided further clarity on the statutory expectations in the Department for Education's 'Keeping children safe in education' guidance.

If you are a school with a religious character, we've also made changes to make sure that you don't run the risk of concurrent inspections from Ofsted and their section 48 inspectorate.

If we find safeguarding concerns in an otherwise high-performing school, and we think leaders can resolve these issues quickly, then we'll suspend our inspection, let parents know, but won't publish a report until after we've returned in no more than 3 months' time.

As part of our changes next year, we'll be putting forward plans for a new, stand-alone assessment of safeguarding in our reports.

We've changed our practice for ungraded school inspections. We no longer carry out full deep dives when inspecting quality of education, which allows more time for professional dialogue: "done with", not "done to".

Finally, as part of my drive to be 'of the sector', we've introduced the Academy. This is a one-stop-shop that will draw together induction, training, learning, professional development and good practice in one, easy to find place.

We've also set up 6 national hubs to improve consistency across all of our regions.

We have begun to publish the materials that we use for inspection training, something that we have been asked to do for a while, which shows you how our inspectors are trained to inspect your schools. Our consultation in January

#### So, what will we be proposing in January?

Well, our consultation will seek your views on a number of things, from new report card-style reports to how we inspect inclusion in schools.

## Early years foundation stage profile results: 2023 to 2024

Published 28 November 2024- DFE

These annual statistics report on teacher assessments of children's development at the end of the early years foundation stage (EYFS), specifically the end of the academic year in which a child turns 5. This is typically the summer term of reception year.

They cover the following at national and subnational level, including breakdowns by child characteristics of:

- the percentage of children assessed to be at the 'emerging' or 'expected' level in the 17 early learning goals across the 7 areas of learning
- the percentage of children with a good level of development
- the average number of early learning goals for which children are at the expected level

## **School-Based Nursery Capital Grant**

17 October 2024 - DFE- Press release

First round of funding launches for up to 300 school-based nurseries - part of government's opportunity mission to give every child the best start in life.

<u>Primary schools can now apply for up to £150,000</u> of £15 million capital funding, with the first stage of the plan set to support up to 300 new or expanded nurseries across England.

The School-Based Nursery Capital Grant is a one-time grant available for eligible state-funded primary-phase schools. Schools can bid for up to £150,000 of funding to use for capital expenditure to:

- convert spare space within school buildings into a new nursery
- · expand an existing nursery

## Ofsted to postpone initial teacher education inspection cycle

Published 27 November 2024- Ofsted

Ofsted has postponed the start to its next initial teacher education (ITE) inspection cycle until the 2025/26 academic year, following a request by the Secretary of State for Education. The Secretary of State has requested the postponement ahead of more substantive changes to the ITE inspection framework, including the introduction of report cards, due in September 2025.
